
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Senior spotlight

Total Solar Eclipse - April 8th, by Jade Colburn, 10th grade Journalism student



Keep your chin up, literally! On April 8th, a total solar eclipse will cross North America, cutting through Mexico, the United States, and Canada. A solar eclipse is when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth. This specific positioning blocks the sun's rays and casts a shadow on Earth, making the sky very dark and creating (what appears to be) a ring of light in the sky! What makes this year's eclipse special is it is predicted to be the last total solar eclipse visible from the United States until the year 2044. Unfortunately, citizens positioned in Charlotte will not be able to witness the total phase of the eclipse; nevertheless, it can still be observed as a partial eclipse from that area.

Safety Warning: Make sure when observing the total solar eclipse you are equipped with the proper safety equipment. Looking at the eclipse directly or through a camera lens for an extended period can cause severe damage to your vision. Viewers are advised to wear eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer.
