

Festival map created by Anna Petty, 10th grade art student





Charlotte Museum of History

Jennifer Williams, public history enthusiast and parent volunteer, organized a behind the scenes tour of the <u>The Charlotte Museum of History</u> for the 10th grade Green Humanities students. Students learned how objects are acquired, cataloged, and preserved. They also learned about the decisions that curators make when creating exhibits. The Green Humanities students will put their learning to work by creating new interpretive signs at Alexandriana Park, a local historic site.





The beginning of fall is an exciting time. The start of the new season brings with it cooler temperatures, seasonal flavors, and the promise of holidays. More exciting than any of that is the knowledge that soon the trees will begin to shed their typical vert, instead adopting brilliant shades of yellow and red. This beautiful change is one of nature's many wonders. However, in this case, wonder no more about why it happens! The reason for this occurrence is quite simple: as winter approaches, the days shorten and the sunlight lessens. This means that the chlorophyll responsible for both photosynthesis and for leaves' typical green shade begins to deteriorate, breaking down in the leaf and revealing the brilliant yellow or orange hues previously masked.

If you see a tree with darker red leaves, that's a result of a separate chemical reaction. Excess sugars trapped in the leaves produce the chemical Anthocyanin, which is responsible for the red coloration in not only leaves but cherries, strawberries, and apples. Not all trees will experience this reaction, but if you're seeking out red leaves, species like maples, dogwoods, or oaks will be your best bet. Not just the species of the tree determines the colors it will wear. Weather conditions also have a large impact on this change. The ideal conditions for vibrant leaves appear to be warm clear days and cool crisp nights in the time of lessening chlorophyll. If you're hoping to see colorful leaves this weekend, check out <u>App State's Fall Color Map</u> to see where autumn is at its peak!



Squirrel rehabilitation pre-release cage is up and in use by the pond!

Have you noticed the wood and wire cage as you've walked around the pond, and wondered what it was? It's a pre-release cage that will be used by squirrel rehabilitators to prepare baby squirrels who have been displaced from their woodland homes for release into the wild.

The pre-release cage project was spearheaded by Ms. Michele, the middle school Explore! teacher, and her students. Ms. Michele is a licensed wildlife rehabilitator who recently started <u>New Leaf Wildlife</u> <u>Rehab</u>, a non-profit dedicated to helping animals displaced by urbanization and to educating the public about urban wildlife. If you visit the squirrel pre-release cage, here are few things to remember:

- Please stay several feet away from the cage so as not to disturb the squirrels. You may observe QUIETLY and from a distance!
- Please do not try to feed the squirrels.
- Most of all, remember they are wild animals, and not pets! They will bite!
- Allow them the time and space to become a part of PSCS natural habitat!
